#### When the call comes ... choose adventure!

Before the prolonged enduring heat of the long hot summer really set in, a need presented itself locally. Doug received a call and two llamas within an hour's drive needed to be sheared, "could you do it?" "Yes, of course! For the health of someone's llamas, count us in." So, arrangements were made with the new owner as they were recent adoptions from SELR, and we arrived on a Saturday in July. As it would happen, the new owner was unable to assist us, but did have a friend available. The friend knew nothing about llamas either general or specific (not even the names); and the owner requested the friend video tape the day so he could watch at a later time, so the help really wasn't. After 2.5 hours of walking back and forth in the July heat in a pasture of about 5 acres, we decided the task was not going to be accomplished without an army of volunteers!

New arrangements were made for the following weekend. Phone calls were made to both current and past FALA members who are also in the area. Chris and Robin Schwarz were able to assist as was Charlene Braun, excellent, that meant five of us and whatever friend(s) the owner could arrange. Okay, so it was a small army. As luck would have it, when we arrived, no one was there to assist. We had permission, so we went about our business of trying to secure the llamas so they could be sheared. We were walking, walking, walking, and planning and plotting both through the sunshine and through the rain. After about 2.5 hours, we had our first catch! Now, he just needed to be led to the barn. Seriously, by now, it felt like it was miles from one end of the pasture to the other. We were hot, tired and wet. We decided to plug on, and continued with our many, many, many more valiant attempts to capture the 2<sup>nd</sup> llama. After a day of hearty exercise and all of us getting weary, we finally made capture number two, 3 hours of

chessboard-type maneuvering! It was now off to the barn; again, at the opposite end of the pasture. After securing him for the night and leaving both with food and water. We made arrangements to come back the following day and do the shearing. Since Chris, Robin and Charlene had prior engagements for Sunday; I returned to the phone and called upon Charles and Mary Poillion to ask if they could assist us with shearing. They said, "Yes."

Sunday arrived. Two weekends and finally shear day was going to happen! Third time's a charm, right? Charles and Mary met us there and we each brought in our equipment. The llamas were no worse for the ordeal of being "cooped up in a barn." We made the plan together that Charles would shear, and Doug would assist and clear the area of wool as it fell around their feet. Both Mary and I were cast in the roles as observers.

It appeared neither of the llamas had been sheared in years and both were very matted. Due to the mats this task was very labor intensive. On a side note, both behaved rather well once the shearing began. Did I mention it was July? After 4 hours of hot work, which included gathering up all our equipment (corral panels, shears, feed buckets, water buckets, halters, leads, extension cords, etc.) and loading them onto the truck. We were ready to leave, we were dusty and tired. The llamas actually looked refreshed and much cooler. Since we never did learn their names, may I present to you Puffy and Fluffy. It doesn't matter by which name you call them; they are no longer Puffy or Fluffy.
